AFGHAN HOUNDS


Afghanistan's ancient aristocrats are newly popular in this country

The Afghan bound was first known to the Western world as a mankeylike dog whose picture was found carved on the ancient tombs in the valley of the Nile. These dogs were so curious and unlike any known breed that they were believed to be imaginary. Years later the actual dog was found living in the hill country of Afghanistan and it was established that the Afghan had been in Egypt as far back as 4000 B.C. The Afglian has probably existed in its present state longer than any other dog. The first Afghan to leave the

East came to England in 1907, and the first one was registered in this country in 1926.

Today in the U.S. the Afghan has become popular and a consistent winner at all dog shows. Best show Afghan in the U.S. is Rudiki (see cores), whose owner, Marion Florsheim of Darien, Conn., is a foremost Afghan breeder. A quiet dog, the Afghan seldom barks and, though affectionate, is never demonstrative. It has an aristocratic character and elegant manners and, because of its speed and grace, is beautiful to watch.

Show-dog grounds has to be done every day. A good Alghan has a narrow, powerful head set on a long neck. His body should be strong and the hair on his head should be combed into a topknot. As a pet, the Alghan is at bome in city or country.



Alghan's bindquarters are covered with long hair and look somewhat like a monkey's hindquarters. Pedigreed Afghan puppies for pets cost from \$100 to \$250. Show puppies sell from \$300 to \$1,500, slightly higher than for other pedigreed dogs.
